Video #1 • "Bike-Friendly Soo"
Interview with Roger Blanchard, Co-founder, Bike-Friendly Soo

The objective of Bike Friendly Soo is to make Sault Ste. Marie a Bicycle Friendly Community, a designation from the League of American Bicyclists. Roger Blanchard started the group Bike Friendly Soo in 2017, and they have been working with Sault Ste. Marie to develop a plan for making the town bicycle friendly. **Roger Blanchard** is a former professor of chemistry at Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie MI and an avid cyclist.

Video #2 • "Ojibwe Apothecary Botanical Sanctuary" Interview with Monica Cady, Sault Tribe

Sault Tribe Member Monica Cady has turned her once-manicured lawn into a permaculture-demo site. "Lots of native plants have volunteered. It's now a Pollinator garden with: asters, golden rod, milkweed, elecampane, cup plant, heal-all, yarrow, and more edibles and medicinal plants." *Monica Cady* graduated from Prescott College with a B.A. in Sustainable Community Development with Indigenous Perspective. She is the recipient of the United Plant Savers Native Medicinal Plant Conservation Award.

Video #3 • "Keeping Community Investments in the Community"
Interview with Dr. Phil Bellfy, Professor Emeritus, Michigan State University

Phil Bellfy was the only bidder who stepped up to save an abandoned school in

Chippewa County. He'll tell us how he plans to honor the "community investment" that local people have made over the years in the building, and his ideas for fixing it up and turning some of the rooms into places for community events. Native Americans living in the Great Lakes woodlands often intentionally bent trees into different shapes in order to mark trails. Trail marker trees have a distinct shape, with one shape going upward, making a turn and then going upward again, although other shape variations have been discovered. In this presentation, *Bill Van Kosky* of the Marquette Regional History Center will tell us about this fascinating topic and share photos of trail marker trees that can still be seen today in the area.

**Hundreds of blue-spotted salamanders at Presque Isle Park** used to be killed by vehicles during their spring migration – until a special road closure helped protect them, and salamander-spotting turned into a popular nocturnal activity! **Kathleen Henry** will help us learn more about local salamander research and advocacy efforts, led by NMU students and professors in collaboration with Superior Watershed Partnership.

"Bad River & Enbridge Line 5: What Are the Risks?"
Chairman Mike Wiggins, Mashkiiziibii (Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa)

In 2019 the Bad River Tribe sued Enbridge to shut down Line 5 through its reservation in northern Wisconsin. In November 2022 a federal court ordered the Tribe and Enbridge to come up with a joint proposal to shut down and purge the pipeline to avoid a "catastrophic" rupture. Bad River Chairman *Mike Wiggins Jr.* will share the latest on the struggle to assert the Tribe's sovereignty. Before becoming the chairman of the Bad River Band, Wiggins served as a conservation warden for the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission. Today, he is a vocal leader in the protection of the Penokee Hills and maintaining safe groundwater.

"COP27 Learning and Outcomes: The Way Forward"

Since 2019, Michigan Technological University has been an official observer organization for United Nations Framework Convention (UNFCCC) on Climate Change annual conference, also known as COP. A cohort of MTU students and professors attended the COP27 conference in 2022 and presented their research and education work. In today's event, *Dr. Shardul Tiwari* will lead a conversation about the importance of the UNFCCC in addressing climate change. Shardul Tiwari (MSc, PhD) is a research scholar and teacher at Michigan Technological University. His research focuses on energy justice, energy policy, and the integration of renewable energy technologies in the U.S. electricity market.

The Coalition to Save the Menominee River, Inc. is a grassroots campaign to stop the Back Forty Project, a controversial sulfide mine that threatens the Menominee River. Nancy Stencil of the Coalition's Board of Directors will provide an update on ongoing litigation, community-led resistance, and alarming new mining designs that include both open pit and underground mining, and onsite storage of toxic waste.

Clare will present on UP Land Conservancy's progress in protecting 165 acres of the Dead River Community Forest in Negaunee Township. Partnerships, community input, and priority conservation areas are at the center of this project. Learn more about who UPLC is working with and how DRCF will be a place for connections—connecting people to the land, connecting protected lands together, and connecting people with each other on the land through community engagement and local stewardship. A graduate of NMU, Clare Fastiggi joined the UP Land Conservancy in 2021. She is the UPLC Lands Program Manager.

**Dave Aho, Rudyard.** Dave was born in the rural UP mining community of Ishpeming and was the youngest of seven children. The family lived in a minimalistic household with a strong emphasis on nature and self-reliance. After receiving a B.S. degree in Industrial Engineering and Technology from Central Michigan University, and working in the automotive industry for many years, he and his wife Stephanie moved back / to the Upper Peninsula. While in the UP, he worked in the Information and Technology field, lastly retiring from Lake Superior State University. Dave is a vocal supporter of protecting our natural world and all those who live in it, he is active in groups such as: the Sierra Club, Habitat for Humanity, local animal shelters, and other advocacy groups.

**Steven C. Garske, Marenisco.** Areas of interest: Ecology, botany and plant taxonomy, wilderness and rewilding, organic gardening, alternative energy, and defining and promoting a sustainable UP economy. B.S. in Biology, University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, and M.S. in Biology, University of Minnesota Duluth. Steve has worked full-time as a biologist since 2001. He has served as Save the Wild UP Board Secretary from 2013 through 2016, and as UPEC Board Secretary since July 2018.

**Kathleen M. Heideman, Marquette**. Interests include environmental stewardship, wetlands, sulfide mining threats, ecopoetics and landscape painting. B.F.A. Minneapolis College of Art & Design, and M.A. Northern Michigan University. Heideman is the author of Psalms of the Early Anthropocene (Winter Cabin Books); Fellow of the National Science Foundation's Antarctic Artists & Writers Program; Artist in Residence with Isle Royale N.P. and Sleeping Bear Dunes N.L. She served as president of Save the Wild UP (2014–16), and joined UPEC to found the Mining Action Group.

**Connie Julien, Houghton.** Current President of the Peter Wolfe Chapter of the North Country National Scenic Trail. Areas of interest: forestry, Lake Superior, water quality, quality of the UP environment, and non-motorized trails. B.S. and M.S. in Chemistry, and M.S. in Business Administration, all from Michigan Technological University. Served on the UPEC Board since the late 1980s; first as a Coalition Rep to UPEC for FOLK, then as an At-large member of UPEC board. Employment background: chemist, research office manager, and web page designer. Was an original member of FOLK Steering Committee and editor of the FOLK newsletter in the 1980s.

**Ryan Leary, Skandia.** Ryan currently lives in Skandia on a small farm with his wife and daughter. Going to "camp" in the UP with his dad since he was a young kid, these trips exposed him to nature and the natural world in ways that shaped his being. He earned a B.S. in Forestry from UW-Stevens Point and a Master in Natural Resources from Utah State. Leary worked as a biologist for varying agencies throughout the Pacific Northwest from 2003 to 2015, mainly in stream habitat monitoring and fisheries. Since moving to the UP full-time in 2015, his efforts have focused on building the farm and raising his daughter.

**Jon Saari, Marquette**. Areas of interest: ecological history, protected lands in UP, local land trusts, and community conservation grant programs. B.A., Yale University, M.A. and, Ph.D, Harvard University. Worked as a historian at Northern Michigan University 1971–2005; taught modern Chinese history, historiography, Finnish-American immigration history. Lived in East Asia for five years. Wife Christine, artist and writer. Joined the UPEC Board in the late 1970s, and served as President 2001–2010.

**Horst Schmidt, Hubbell.** Horst comes to the Keweenaw via Milwaukee and Eagle River (Wisconsin), moving to the UP full-time in August of 2013. Horst has a background in social services with community organizing skills from social justice work. As he has dug into his new home, Horst sees newly invigorated communities with people willing to work together. As part of his community involvement, Horst sees a greater need than ever for environmental groups and tribes to work together, as well as drawing in other sectors to fix past mistakes and avoid future degradation. Growing, vibrant, healthy communities needs to be everyone's goal.

**Evan Zimmermann, Marquette.** Evan fulfilled his life goal to move from Wisconsin to the UP in 2010 after years of visits for outdoor recreation. Technology Coordinator for the Marquette Food Co-op. He studied Computer Science at Concordia University (Wisconsin) and earned a BA in English, finding balance in modernity with poetry that celebrates symbiosis with our natural environment. He believes that the UP can be a model society for preserving the wilderness while building community and engaging our creative spirit.
